



MAJOR CHOSEN: APPAREL, TEXTILES, AND DESIGN

I. A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE MAJOR

The Apparel, Textiles, and Design major is a broad based program providing preparation for entry into the fashion industry, creative sewing and design careers, and graduate school. Core courses include clothing design and construction, textiles, costume history, and fashion merchandising. A senior internship is available in an ATD professional workplace. A minor in art or business is recommended.

II. COURSE HIGHLIGHTS

Here are some of the courses you will especially enjoy:

Apparel Construction I This class provides the opportunity to learn or perfect basic apparel construction skills. Instruction will be given in selecting and using commercial patterns, basic pattern alterations, and specific construction and design techniques.

Apparel Construction II This class builds on *Apparel Construction I* skills and provides additional, advanced construction opportunities and detail work.

Advanced Construction Techniques You will receive experience sewing specialty fabrics, design details, and applying decorative designs.

Sewing for the Home This class introduces you to the world of sewing for the home and interior design. You will receive lecture material and lab experiences in table linens, window treatments, pillows, and bed linens. The *Sewing for Interior Design II* class will provide further, more specialized experiences.

Textiles for the Consumer In this class you will study fibers, weaves, finishes, and manufacturing processes in the textile industry.

Apparel, Textiles, & Design Internship You will take this course your senior year. You will gain practical on-the-job type experience in a clothing and textiles area of your choosing.

Flat Pattern Design Students design and construct original patterns to achieve proper fit and to include various style details. *Advanced Pattern Design* continues this process with the design of specialty items.

History of Apparel Students study the dress from ancient Egypt to modern times as influenced by changes in history.



III. A TYPICAL YEARLY COURSE SEQUENCE

This is a suggested program of study for you. Other refinements to your program can be made when you consult your faculty advisor at the time of your enrollment.

You will notice that some courses are listed as electives. These electives give you the opportunity to tailor your program by selecting courses you would like to take for your own personal enjoyment.

IV. FACILITIES, EQUIPMENT, AND OPPORTUNITIES

The sewing lab has 21 modern computerized sewing machines, several overlock sewing machines, an embroidery machine, commercial ironing systems, demonstration facilities, fitting room, closets, cutting tables and work spaces. The lab is also equipped with a variety of sewing accessories, samples, and related equipment for your use.

The Interior Design Lab has 17 fully equipped drafting tables, a sample lab and product literature library, and a blueprint machine. Student design projects are often displayed in this lab.

The Family and Consumer Sciences Forum (FCS Forum) is a student-run organization for FCS majors, minors, and elective students. The forum meets once per semester, offering noted FCS professionals as speakers, many of whom are FCS Division graduates. Students develop leadership skills and gain valuable knowledge about FCS ministries and careers. FCS Forum is an excellent way for you to become involved and practice becoming a FCS professional.

Chapel is a central feature of Bob Jones University. This 35-minute service is held every morning, Monday through Thursday. These services are a source of great inspiration to students. Four days a week the Chapel message is brought by the President or by selected speakers. Each Friday the Chapel period is devoted to the meetings of various literary societies.

The Bob Jones University Museum and Gallery houses a world-renowned collection of sacred art, the most extensive collection in the Western Hemisphere. You will be able to receive inspiration and stimulation by studying the works in this collection.

Davis Field House, with over 87,000 square feet and seating for 3,000 people, contains 4 full-sized courts; auxiliary courts; indoor and outdoor tracks; swimming pool; café; and a fitness center with fully-equipped exercise room, aerobic room, sauna, and whirlpool.

The Media Center contains all the audiovisual equipment you are likely to use in teaching, including equipment for preparing transparencies, videotapes, laminated bulletin board figures, slide presentations, signs, and duplicating equipment. You will learn how to use these various machines under the guidance of our trained and dedicated staff. The Media Center is also equipped with various curriculum materials, textbooks, and teaching materials for all grade levels and subjects.

The Mack Library covers 89, 000 square feet of floor space and has seating for over 1,300 students. It provides you with 318, 000 items, including 17,000 music recordings, 70 electronic databases through the library website, and over 1,100 current periodical titles. In addition, the library participates in the statewide PASCAL Delivers program, allowing students to check out books from a statewide catalog of over nine million books. An interlibrary loan program for out of state borrowing is available through OCLC, a national database for books not held in our library. Other prominent features include the Jerusalem Chamber, a replica of a room in London's Westminster Abby in which work was done on the 1611 King James Bible, and the University Archives Room which displays materials about the Founder and the history of Bob Jones University.

If you are planning to live on campus, you will be glad to know that all of our residence halls are air-conditioned, have wall-to-wall carpeting, and have a phone in each room. You will be able to make long-distance calls directly from your room and have them automatically placed on your school bill. Computer network connectivity is available in all residence halls, as well.



All of our classrooms are air-conditioned, and most sidewalks are covered to keep you dry when it is raining. The Dining Common serves 8,500 delicious meals a day, and the Snack Shop and Campus Store in the Student Center carry just about anything you'll need.

You will find the finest Christian young people in the country are your fellow students, and without trying too hard, you may end up making a life-long friend!

V. ABOUT THE FACULTY

The members of the FCS faculty, which includes the Apparel, Textiles, & Design major, are well qualified to teach you. They hold degrees from or have done advanced work at *Bob Jones University, Purdue University, Winthrop University, Massachusetts University, Radford University, Eastern Michigan University, Clemson University*, and the *University of Delaware*. They have taught in their respective areas for a number of years, are knowledgeable in their subject matter, are experienced seamstresses, and stay abreast of latest trends and technology.

FCS faculty members have participated in a wide range of FCS-related activities outside the classroom. Some hold membership in the *American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences* and attend state and/or national conventions annually. Several faculty members have held various offices at the state level. Faculty members have given numerous FCS related workshops and seminars, worked with residential and commercial interior design, researched institutional foods, served as speakers at local women's retreats/seminars, seamstresses, wedding coordinators, and have conducted a variety of in-service workshops and adult education classes. A FCS faculty member wrote *Family Life Skills for Christian Schools*, a high school family living textbook, and *Health for Christian Schools*, both published by Bob Jones University Press.
